NWF's Northeast Regional Center is the region's largest conservation organization with more than 600,000 members and supporters. Since 1974, the Northeast Center has tackled the region's most important conservation issues, including:



Protecting Wildlife.

Lead the successful effort to recover Vermont's peregrine falcon which were extinct in Vermont and the northeast in the 1960s. Today, more than 38 breeding pairs make Vermont their home.



Restored and Protected Northeast Forests for Future Generations.

Developed with the Forest Stewardship Council an independent certification system to improve practices on millions of acres of private forestland and create markets for sustainable wood products.



Reducing Pollution and Confronting Climate Change.

Organized a large scale education and mobilization efforts on a variety of critical environmental issues, including winning strong state and federal actions to reduce mercury pollution and more recently working to pass federal global warming legislation.



Connecting People to Nature.

Lead one of the Northeast's leading environmental education programs. Developed a national model "place-based" education program called "A Forest for Every Classroom" that has been adopted in Vermont, New Hampshire, Montana and Texas.

Our current staff includes experts in wildlife, global warming, clean energy, sustainable forestry, air and water pollution, education, and urban environmental issues.
